he 100th anniversary of the Lincoln Motor Car Company was celebrated at this year's Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, with three classes devoted to the marque: Lincoln V-8, Lincoln V-12 and Zephyr and Continental through 1962. The official poster (and program cover) was appropriately Lincoln-themed, with artist Tim Layzell portraying Edsel Ford standing next to a 1941 Lincoln Continental Cabriolet with a 1932 Lincoln KB Murphy Roadster nearby, positioned on the lawn in front of the Lodge. Is there any question that Lincoln's finest years were during the Classic Era? It was during those years

that Lincoln's reputation for quality was established, complemented by fine designs from American coachbuilders including Judkins, Willoughby, Locke, Dietrich, Brunn, LeBaron and Holbrook. Edsel Ford forged relationships with these coachbuilders and examples of each were represented on the field this year.

A single class of McFarlans showcased this seldom-seen luxury marque from Connersville, Indiana. The examples present were all Full Classics® and most familiar to Southern California Region members were the Nethercutt's 1923 Knickerbocker Cabriolet and Stan Lucas's 1926 Roadster.

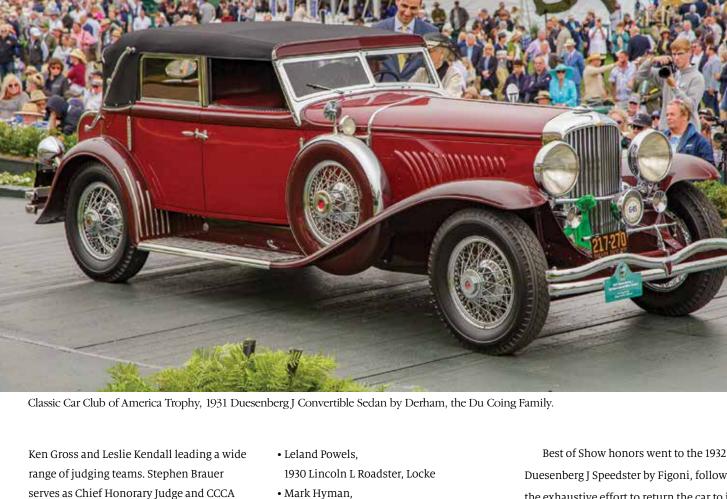
On the sporting end of the Classic spectrum, Class N: Alfa Romeo 8C 2300 celebrated Alfa's supercharged, eightcylinder engine. Introduced in 1931, it provided significantly more power than its six-cylinder predecessors, the 6C 1500 and 1750 models, yet retained the true sports car characteristics that are somewhat lacking in the later 8C 2900B street models.

Class P-1 provided Classic elegance, recognizing early Graber coachbuilder. The Swiss firm was known for understated, elegant designs, as demonstrated by the examples on the field which included Bugatti, Delahaye, Voisin, Duesenberg and Packard chassis with Graber coachwork.

Class K featured Talbot-Lago's T26 Grand Sport, the custom-bodied, limited production model built from 1948 to 1951, making a strong case for post-1948 Full Classic® status. Grand Sport models carried a variety of stunning designs by a wide range of European coachbuilders including Antem, Dubos, Figoni & Falaschi, Franay, Pennock, Saoutchik and Stabilimenti Farini.

The traditional classes for American and European Classics were supplemented with marque-specific classes for Packard, Duesenberg and Rolls-Royce. Adding in Classic representation in the Pre- and Post-War Preservation classes and the Early LeMans Centennial class, Full Classics® made up 105 of the 220 automobiles entered with representation in 18 of the 28 classes.

CCCA member representation among judges was also strong, led by Chris Bock as Head Judge along with Chief Class Judges Steve Morton, David Schultz, Steve Snyder, Al McEwan, Richard Adatto, Peter Hageman



serves as Chief Honorary Judge and CCCA editor Ruben Verdes serves as a judge for the Rolls-Royce Prewar class.
