In all, 19 Full Classics® assembled in front of the Clubhouse properly placed by Regional Board member Paul Whitney, after he made two trips home to retrieve his 1930 LaSalle 340 Phaeton by Fleetwood and his freshly-restored 1936 Packard 1404 Super Eight Coupe Roadster. Additional Board participation included a pair of John Milliken's Convertible Sedans, his 1939 Buick 80 and his 1941 Cadillac 62, Robert Robin's 1940 Cadillac 90 Touring Sedan by Fleetwood, Fred Lax's 1934 Auburn 1250 Salon Phaeton and a stunning 1937 Horch 853 Sport Cabriolet by Gläser owned by Aaron Weiss.

From the south, San Diego/Palm Springs Regional Director Mike Adams entered his recently acquired 1928 Lincoln L Willoughby Limousine and from north of Los Angeles came Ron and Sandy Hansen's 1921 Duesenberg Model A Phaeton by Fleetwood. Stanley Zimmerman entered the singular example of a Classic Plymouth: his 1932 Plymouth PB Town Car by Brewster. Former Regional Directors also made contributions with Steve Snyder in attendance, John Nolan who traveled from Riverside to serve as a judging team leader and Rick Zeiger supplying two Classics.

In planning events like this, it's comforting to have a cadre of volunteers on which you can rely. I'll mention and thank tabulators Belva Baltzar and Michelle Snyder as well as Barbara Lax who handled registration and name tags. And treasurer Terry White always keeps spending in check so we stay within our budget.

Judges and tabulators convened for their meeting, led by Area Head Judge John Milliken, while the rest of the participants enjoyed a full breakfast inside the clubhouse. In spite of the light drizzle, "The Show Must Go On," as the cloud cover making for some interesting photographic conditions.

The thorough judging wrapped up as the sun made its debut in time for lunch. Back in the clubhouse, we enjoyed a very California Santa Maria barbecue buffet, complete with local chardonnay and champagne.

We made our way back down the hill to visit the great array of cars Ray and Janet Scherr have assembled over the years. The always-gracious Ray Scherr has a broad appreciation for the automobile, perhaps centered in performance and speed, ranging from a Mercer Type 35 Raceabout to a late >>>

model Bentley Brooklands coupe. Between those two (and I'm sure I'm forgetting a few here and there) are an Alfa Romeo 8C2900B Touring Spyder, a Lagonda LG45 Rapide, a pair of vintage Bentleys and a Stutz Model M boattail speedster. And those are just the Classics. Postwar sports cars include Jaguars (XK-120, 140 and 150 and an E-type), Porsches, Mercedes-Benz 300 SLs (both Gullwing and Roadster variants) and a pair of precious Ferraris (short wheelbase 250 California Spyder and a 250 Tour de France). Then there's a room filled with 1950s automotive Americana, the walls of which are covered with automotive art and memorabilia.

A myriad of other small rooms house the most extensive collection of guitars I have ever seen, each with a story behind them.

Automotive artwork, books and models fill every nook and cranny of these buildings—truly automotive heaven. Thank you Ray, for this opportunity as well as for our previous visits in 2007, 2013 and 2018. I hope you had a great tour in your 1934 Packard Twelve during the days that followed our event.

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
